- Complexity of business structure (shell companies, hidden beneficial ownership)
- Need for innovative legal approaches and collaboration (U.S. Lacey Act example)
- Enforcement Resource Limitations need for prioritization






Security Threats of IUU Fishing

FFA Estimates Pacific IUU Fishing (15 March 2016)

An independent report released by the Forum Fisheries Agency has put a value on the amount of IUU tuna fishing in the Pacific at around \$616 million USD or over 306 million tonnes.

Port State Measures Agreement

- Entered into Force globally in June 2016.
- Currently, there are 61
 Parties covering 86
 Countries.
- Cost effective way to combat IUU Fishing

Global Combating IUU Fishing Initiatives

INTERPOL Fisheries Crime Working Group

- Initiated an ad hoc working group on IUU Fishing (Bangkok – March 2012)
- Seeking international collaboration on criminal IUU fishing/related activities





INTERPOL Purple Notice Outcomes

- Military and police have boarded two toothfish poaching vessels, FV Songhua and FV Yongding, in Cabo Verde, an archipelago state off the northwestern coast of Africa.
- Malaysian authorities detained another two vessels, the FV Viking in April (later blown-up) and the FV Perlon in May. Both vessels had toothfish aboard.
- Another vessel FV Kunlun was detained by authorities in Thailand in March which also had toothfish onboard.
- The U.S. is one of the main markets for this toothfish product. These operations help level the playing field for our U.S. fishermen and benefit the sustainability of global fisheries.

Case Study: *Bangun Perkasa* September 2011





Initial Information

- Found by Japanese surveillance flight
- A Coast Guard helicopter from a cutter observed the vessel next to a driftnet, later found to be in excess of 2.5 km.
- Another HSDN vessel located nearby
- Claimed Indonesia flag
- No flag, call sign, or numbers visible.
- Claimed to be targeting squid
- 22 persons on board





Initial Boarding

- 22 persons on board
 - Taiwanese Master
 - Chinese First Mate, Second Mate, Chief Engineer, and Cook
 - 10 Vietnamese crew
 - 7 Indonesian crew
- No WCPFC license, identification, log, or VMS
- 16 km of driftnet on board
- 20-30 shark carcasses
