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






# Overall objective

To promote safe labour migration and decent work for a sustainable fish and seafood supply chain (including capture fisheries and aquaculture and postharvest processing) in South-East Asia













# **Programme Framework**



- 1. Increase ASEAN and sub-regional connectivity and cooperation on safe labour migration and decent work in the **fish and seafood supply chain**.
- 2. Support national authorities to design, implement and enforce **stronger legal and policy frameworks** on labour migration, labour protection, and sustainable fisheries.
- 3. Promote a culture of accountability, sustainable corporate practices, due diligence, and responsible fishing practices among employers and enterprises, including promoting promising practices and exchanging knowledge.
- 4. Promote **social dialogue**, increase freedom of association and collective bargaining, and empower migrant workers, their families and communities to protect and assert their human and labour right.











## **Context and Background**

- The Blue Economy is key employment source (over 53 million people)
- Accounts for 84% of global fisheries and aquaculture employment.
- COVID-19 worsened vulnerabilities, especially for migrant fishers and export-dependent sectors.
- Domestic seafood supply impacted by food service closures.
- Emerging challenges and opportunities require ongoing support on labour rights and migration governance.
- The project is a second phase and builds on past successes, the new regional programme will strengthen regional cooperation, include aquaculture, and expand to Malaysia and ASEAN partnerships.
- Governance established (Regional PSC, National advisory committees)



#### **Duration**

1 January 2025 – 31 December 2028 (48 months) FAO will focus on 2026 and 2027 implementation

- 2. International Organization for Migration (IOM)
- 3. Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO)



#### **Budget (EU Funded)**

**Total project budget**: USD 11,800,823 **FAO Budget**: 434,763.47 (3.95%)

- Links to the Blue Transformation to ensure the sustainable expansion of aquatic food systems; and the Global Compact on Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration (GCM), protection of survivors of trafficking,
- **Leverages technical** and **sectoral competencies** of the ILO, IOM, and FAO ensuring gender-sensitive and rights-based approaches.
- Aligns regionally with ASEAN goals to foster stronger collaboration between origin and destination countries, supporting exchange and learning through both top-down and bottom-up approaches.
- Addresses the links between labour migration, forced labour, and human trafficking in the fishing and seafood processing sectors.
- **Builds the capacity** of key stakeholders, including government authorities, trade unions, civil society, community-based and grassroots organizations, communities, and both potential and current migrant workers.











- FAO will lead the implementation of <u>regional activities</u> related to capacity building on IUU fishing, Port State Measures, and Sustainable Fisheries Management.
- Three activities under 2 Outputs
- (1) 2.1.3 Provide technical support to the development and implementation of national policies and legal frameworks to combat IUU fishing and fisheries sustainability. [2026]
- (2) 2.2.4 Strengthen national and regional capacity on traceability systems to support the elimination of illegal fishing products in the supply chain. [2026]
- (3) 3.1.2 Support the training, knowledge exchange on climate change adaptation and sustainable fisheries and aquaculture among employers and businesses: [2027]













Activity 2.1.3 Provide technical support to the development and implementation of national policies and legal frameworks to combat IUU fishing and fisheries sustainability. [timeframe in 2026]

- All project countries have NPOA-IUU and accession to PSMA (except Malaysia)
- Additional Guidelines have been developed including PSMA (Port Inspection guidelines), legal checklists and legal guidance; Flag State performance, Transshipment, Global Record and Catch documentation (Next activity 2.2.4)
- PSMA GAP process undertaken in some countries
- FAO suggest to analyze these national and regional policy documents with key stakeholders (linking with legal issues).
- Develop and agree key knowledge products and disseminate findings.














**Activity 2.2.4** Strengthen national and regional capacity on traceability systems to support the elimination of illegal fishing products in the supply chain. [2026/2027]

- All project countries have NPOA-IUU and accession to PSMA (except Malaysia)
- Additional Guidance has been developed by FAO and SEAFDEC eACDS and RFMOS
- FAO proposes to analyze these national and regional policy documents with key stakeholders with a value chain approach
- Develop and agree key knowledge products and disseminate findings.













**Activity 3.1.2** Support the training, knowledge exchange on climate change adaptation and sustainable fisheries and aquaculture among employers and businesses: [2027]

- Identify stakeholders during 2026
- Carry out needs assessment in relation to Climate Change, fisheries and aquaculture;
- Analyze national and regional policy documents with key stakeholders (in terms of project target (labor migration and labor protection).
- Develop and agree key knowledge products and disseminate findings.
